




District A51 NSW (8 Clubs) Linda Pederson Sydney Club




At this time, with COVID 19 breathing at our door, it is fairly difficult as the new President of Canberra Belconnen Inner Wheel Club to make too many plans in advance.

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Wyong NSW President Robyn (20 Members)


