This award, named after the founder of Inner Wheel, is presented to Inner Wheel Members who have given outstanding personal service to the local and wider community and must be completely unconnected with work on behalf of Inner Wheel or for Inner Wheel fundraising. Helen's award certificate states "In recognition of the establishment of Quilts of Valour Australia Inc, which recognizes the service , sacrifice and valour of Australia's War Veterans and their families."

Helen founded Quilts of Valour Australia following a tragic helicopter incident in Afghanistan. Many young soldiers lost their lives and Helen's son was seriously injured. He was flown to a hospital in Germany to be treated. Whilst he was there he saw a beautiful quilt and asked if he could use it. He was told that it was his. The quilt was made by quilters for "Quilts of Valour" in the United States. When speaking to his mother, Helen, he said how wonderful it would be if there was such an organisation in Australia for our veterans.

National Project Report

I must start this report with congratulations and a big thank you to Past National Project Coordinator, Dallice Robbins. Dallice took over this role in 2020-21 and introduced us to the concept of "Seans 2 for 10", using the story of a boy's trip through his illness & the successful outcome, well known public profiles as ambassadors and ultimately raising the public awareness of Inner Wheel. Well done Dallice, you worked tirelessly through some difficulties & doubters and our members thank you.

This years Cord Blood Coordinators have already met on Zoom and are dedicated to the enthusing their members and raising more funds for our wonderful cause, Cord Blood Research.

All clubs will shortly be advised of the availability through your Coordinators of a Polo Shirt designed for Cord Blood. This is a great design and a special price of \$40 GST & freight inclusive has been negotiated. It is hoped that many of you will avail yourselves of this shirt to wear during your fund raising activities.

Designs are being sourced for a new brochure featuring strongly on our National Project as well as a Red pen as the sole merchandise for sale. These will be presented to the IWA Executive for approval.

Conference 2022 looms at last!! The National Project Committee is working hard to bring to you a wonderful presentation on the Project during the opening ceremony.

During the last financial year our clubs raised the amazing amount of \$138,368.16, This was made up of Donations (General Fund Raising) \$80747.45, Seans two for ten \$46504,41, Merchandise sales \$11,116.30. Great effort. Funds from the previous year's efforts resulted in three grants being awarded. A grant unable to be fulfilled due to Covid restrictions and returned to IWA, meant that an additional fourth grant was award. We look forward to hearing about the successful grantee's for this year at our Conference in October.

Members have voiced their disappointment at the demise of "Read the Red". This will be reinstated on a bi monthly basis, listing clubs who have donated funds.

IWA Executive have advised the renaming of Seans two for Ten to Inner Wheel Australia Walk for Cord Blood Research, shortened to IWA Two for Ten walk. The program remains the same with walkers donating \$10 for walking 2klm. Walk date is the 10th March 2023 (though as usual any date around that time can be chosen) with funds attributed to that walk to be with Treasurer Lorraine by the 28th April




