We often say Inner Wheel is a best-kept secret...let's work to change that!




From Vice President Julie...

Here are some that are not! You don't need to keep paper copies of everything! In fact on the ATO website

it says that you can keep paper or electronic copies of supporting documentation, as long as the copies are clear and in English. If not in English then they need to be in a language that is easy to translate. Most records for Not For Profit organisations need to be kept for seven years. State bodies, such as Office of Fair Trade in Queensland will have some requirements that you will need to follow. ALWAYS keep a backup of your electronic records on a secure external memory stick, this will help when changing positions within your Club, District or Executive committees

Did you know...

In 1972, the ECOSOC (Economic and Social Council of the United Nations) confirmed the admission of Inner Wheel on the Roster of Organisations and IIW currently has seven IW members accredited at the United Nations offices in Geneva, Vienna and New York.

Through these members, IIW holds consultative status in the United Nations. Clubs provide information on their projects which support the UN commissions, particularly on the UN's Sustainable Development Goals concerning Human Rights, Rights of the Children, Conditions of Women, the Family and the Elderly, and Substance Abuse, focusing on Health, Education, Empowerment and Opportunity. The Inner Wheel representatives in the UN follow and assist the work sessions of these commissions and report to the IIW Vice President on the activities of the Committees and Conferences.

They are our link with UN organisation, and in turn must report to the UN on what we do in Inner Wheel. Copies of the annual reports from National Representatives are sent to our UN Representatives to keep them informed about the work of our members.
