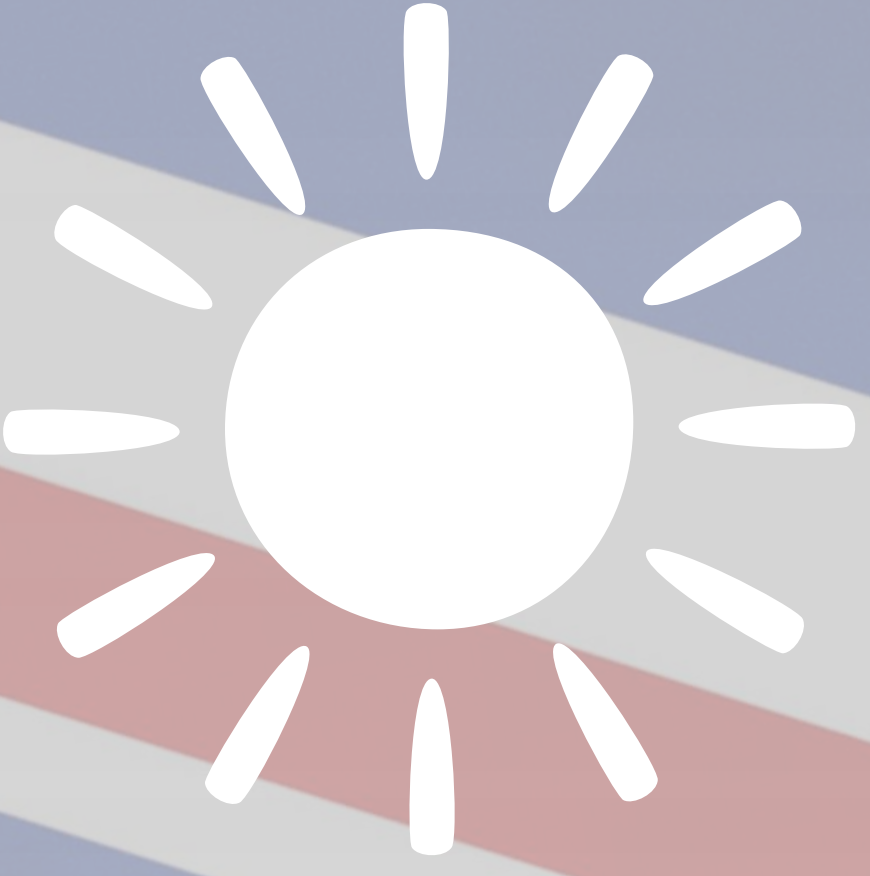

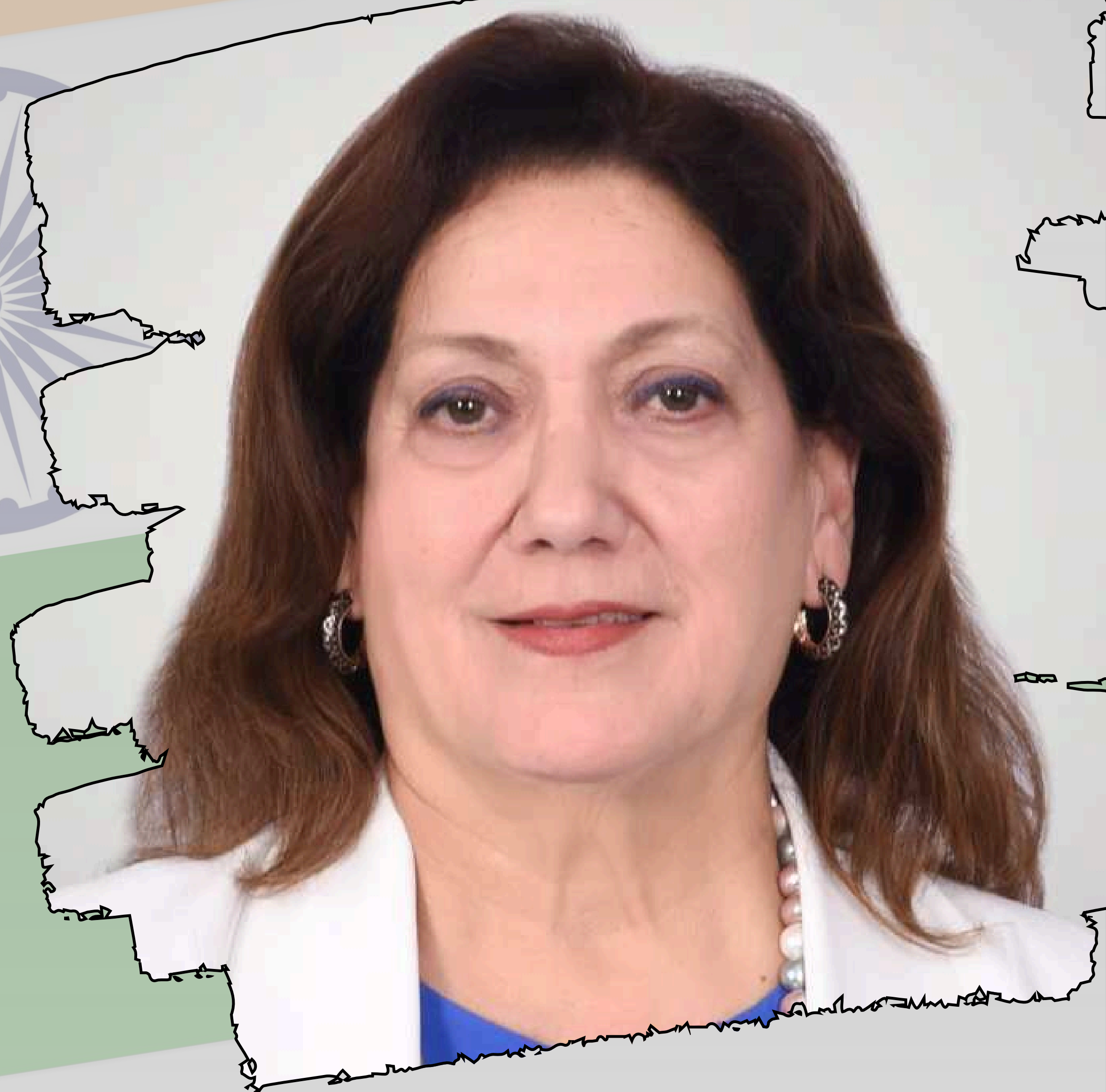

Historical Tours

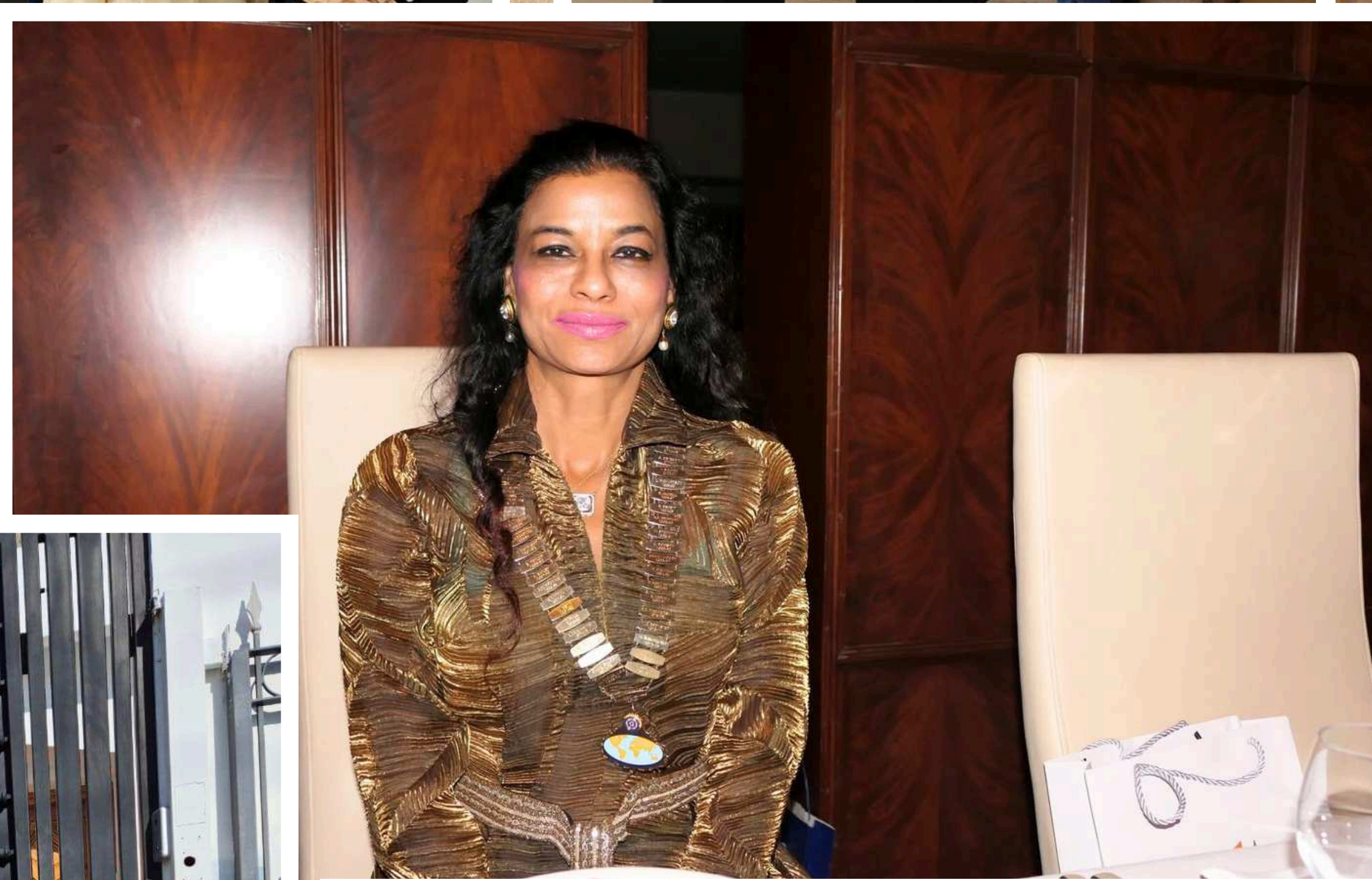

Key Highlights of the Event:

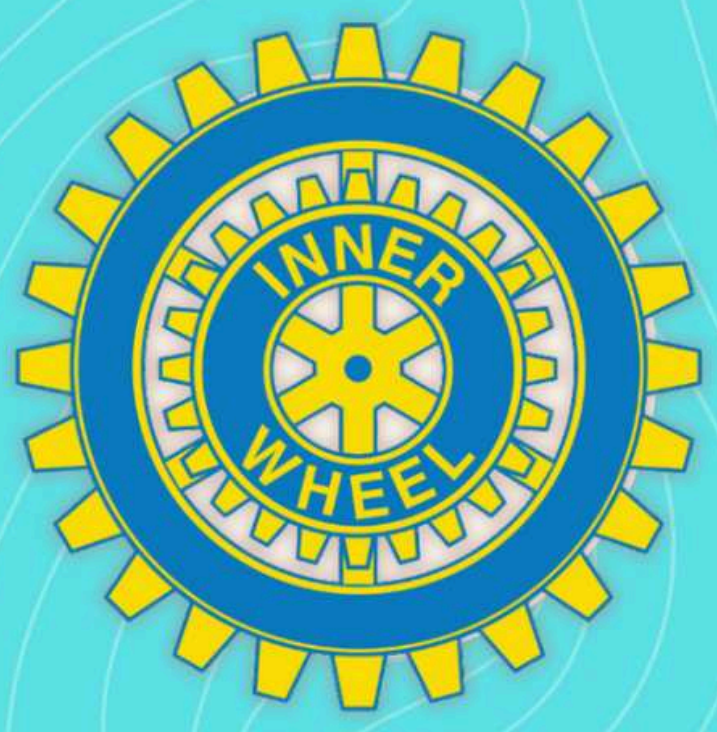
- ISO and Editors' Meet: Held on November 23, bringing together editors and ISO representatives from various districts.

How Orange the World UNiTEd Inner Wheel

Orange the World' campaign -a global initiative by the United Nations to stop violence against women and girls, runs annually from November 25 to December 10, known as the 16 Days of Activism. Iconic buildings worldwide are illuminated with orange lights, symbolizing a new dawn and a day without violence against women and girls. In the Netherlands, Ceja Gregor, IIW UN Representative, inspired Dutch members to form a committee for women and raise awareness about the issue. The movement gained momentum after presentations at the Convention business meeting in Manchester and the European meeting in Budapest. Trish suggested making the campaign global and the UNiTE team was formed. A WhatsApp group, webpage, and blog were created to share information and global activities. . IIW President Mamta Gupta's letter and video recording kicked off the campaign, boosting enthusiasm. Team members, Joost and Gees built further on the webpage and a blog with global activities was started, Trish has, as a super supporter been connecting all dots within Inner Wheel, brilliant Yeok San with ideas about the marketing Blitz, postings every day and came with the idea for TOPICS of the DAY, Talented Sandra who made fantastic designs, the daily graphics and texts, phone wall paper and video's, Rajni keeping our IIW socials, Carina and Christiane all thinking about the projects, Marlies as text writer, everyone was deeply involved to optimize the campaign, every step was discussed: what a team!

The results were astonishing: 700 members joined the WhatsApp group, and an incredible amount of activities were reported worldwide. Influencers, billboards, lectures, events raised awareness even oranges were handed out. Never ever before had a campaign been so widely adopted by members, supported by the IIW Executive Team and IIW President Mamta Gupta. The journey doesn't end here. The UN aims to eliminate violence against women and girls by 2030, a challenging goal that requires not only 16 days campaign but a continued effort.

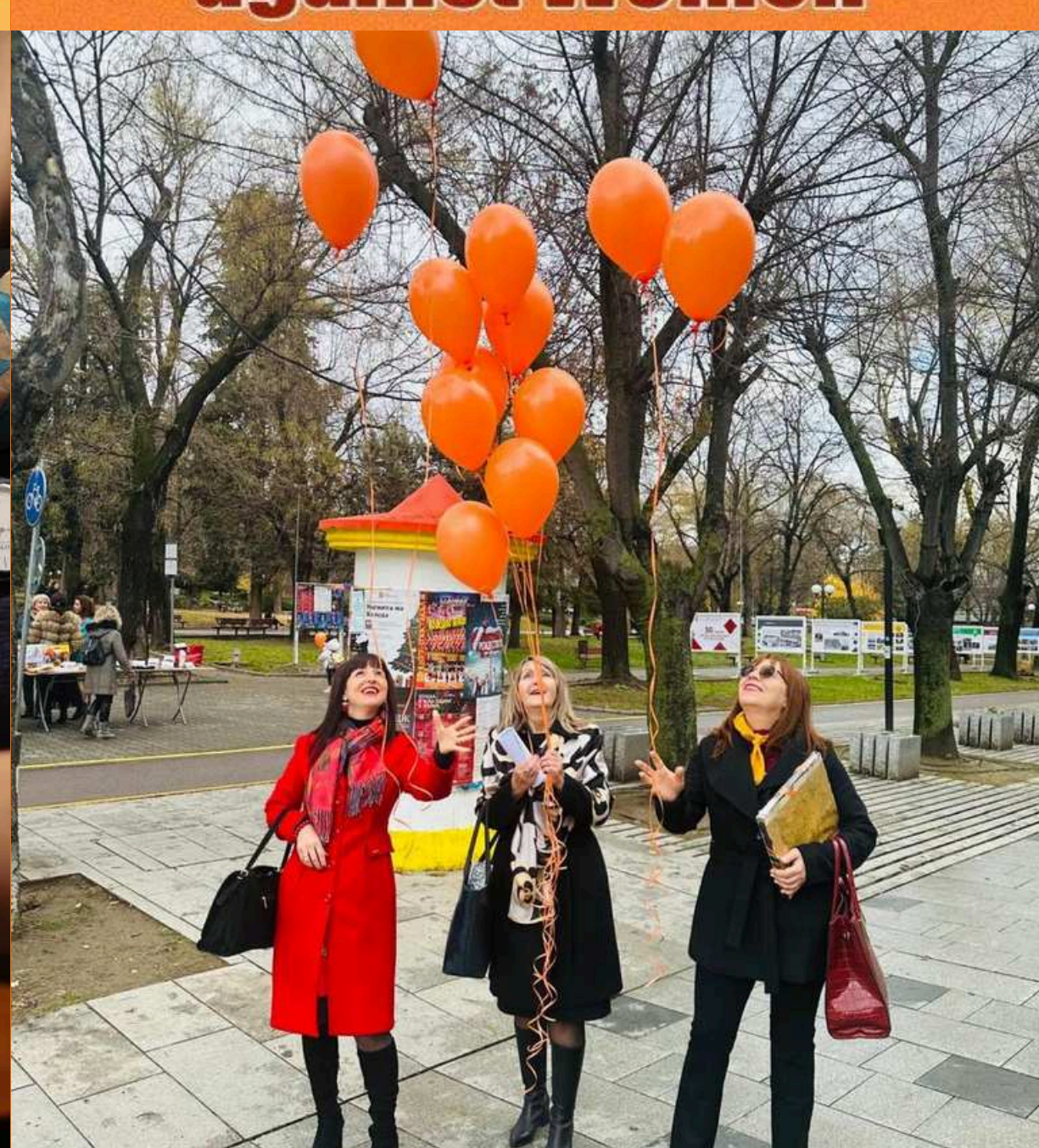

October 24, 1945, marks a historic day - the United Nations Charter came into effect, signed by 51 founding members. Today, the UN has grown to 193 member states, playing a vital role in promoting peace, security, and cooperation globally. The UN's focus for 2024 centers around 17 Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), aiming to end poverty, protect the planet, and ensure peace and prosperity for all.

NGOs and the United Nations

Non-governmental organizations (NGOs) play a crucial role in the UN's mission. The UN Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) grants consultative status to NGOs, enabling them to participate in UN activities. This status is divided into three categories:

- General Consultative Status: granted to organizations with broad representation and significant contributions to multiple fields ¹
- Special Consultative Status: for organizations focused on specific areas ¹

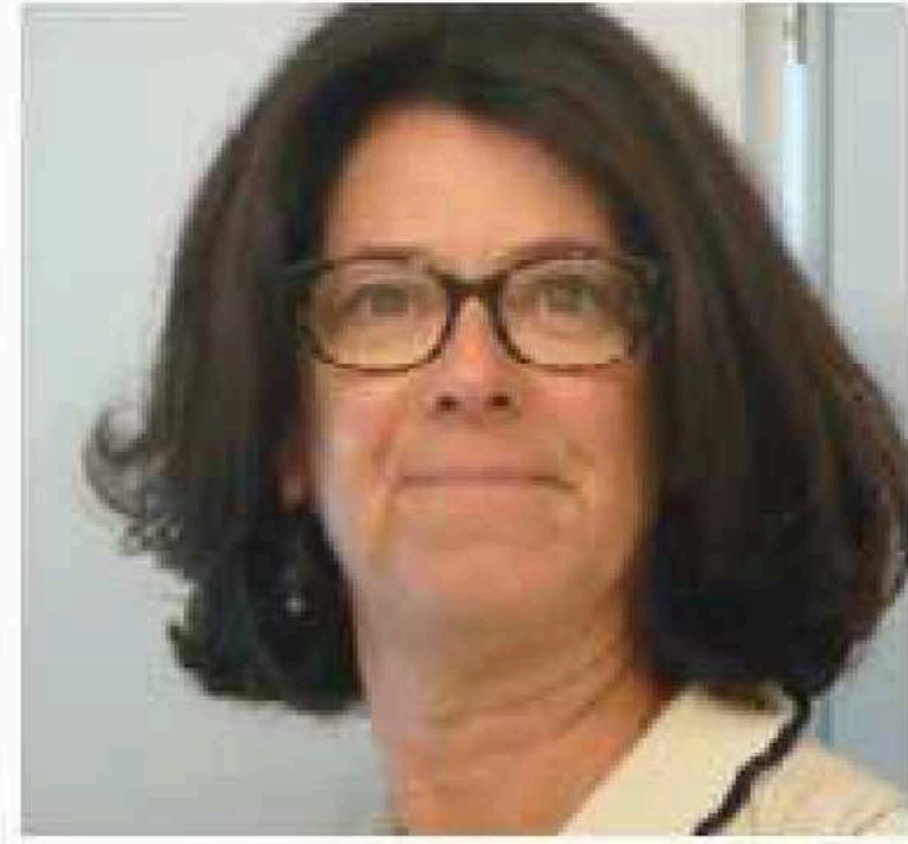

UNITED NATIONS & INTERNATIONAL INNER WHEEL

Inner Wheel's remarkable journey with the United Nations began in 1970 when Board Member Mrs. Legarda from the Philippines suggested applying for consultative status. This marked the starting point of Inner Wheel's formal recognition by the UN¹. In 1972, the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) confirmed Inner Wheel's admission to the roster of organizations, a significant milestone showcasing Inner Wheel's growing global presence and commitment to service. Fast forward to 1993, at the 9th IIW Convention in Sydney, a general motion was passed to confine Inner Wheel's involvement with the United Nations to being an observer with consultative status. This strategic decision aimed to focus Inner Wheel's efforts and maximize its impact. Today, Inner Wheel's involvement with the UN is coordinated by the current IIW Vice President, overseeing the organization's UN Representatives. These representatives play a vital role in:

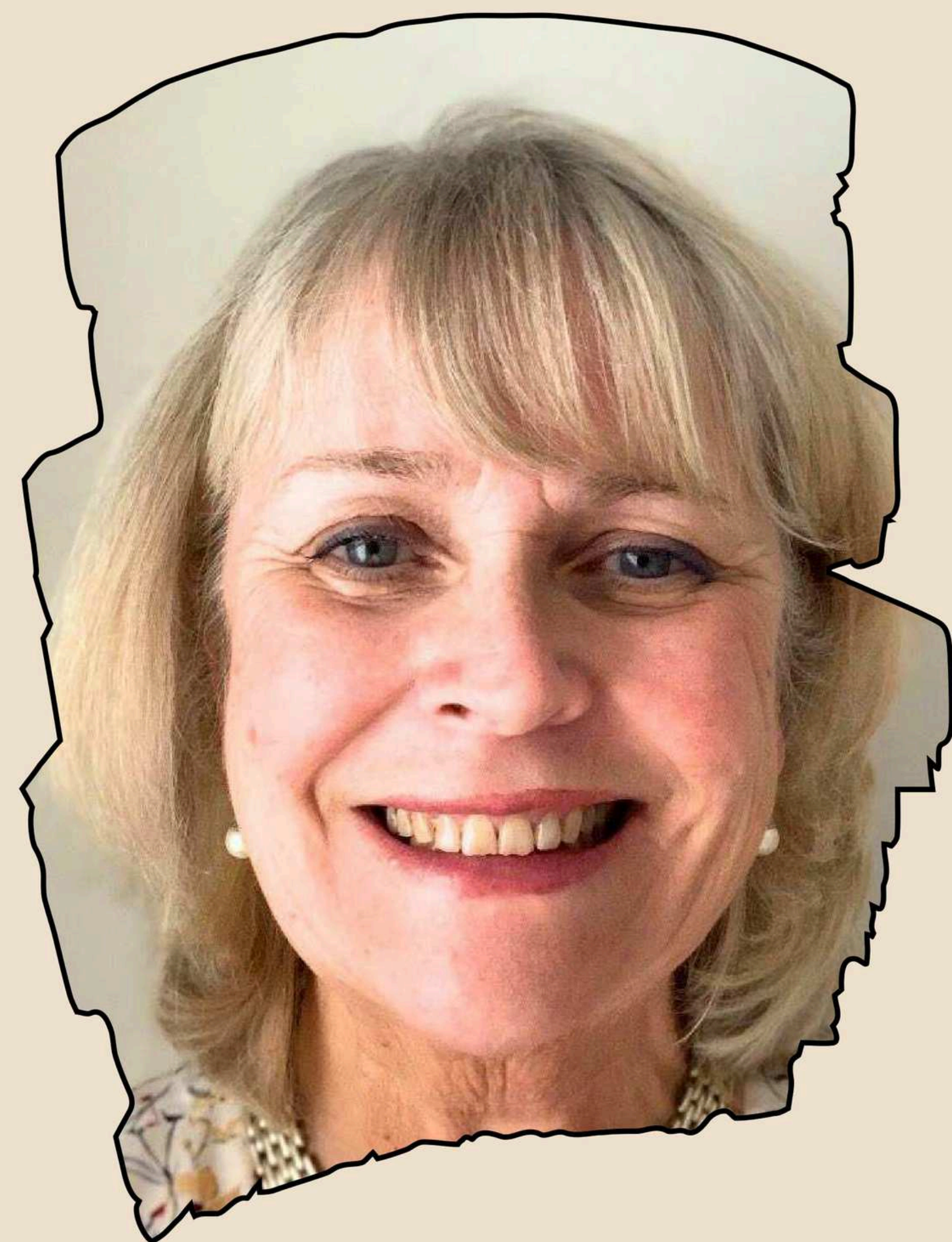
- Following and Assisting UN Commissions: on important themes such as human rights, rights of children, conditions of women and elder people.
- Reporting to the IIW Vice President: on committee and conference activities.
- Serving as the Link: between Inner Wheel and the UN.

To keep its UN Representatives informed, Inner Wheel shares annual reports from national representatives. Inner Wheel's involvement focuses on promoting awareness and implementation of major themes, including support for UN Sustainable Development Goals. Currently, seven Inner Wheel members are appointed at UN offices in Geneva, Vienna, and New York, demonstrating the organization's commitment to global service and collaboration.

Inner Wheel is proudly represented in four Vienna based NGO Committees

1. Committee on Ageing: - The focus of this committee is on human rights for older persons, a sustainable society of all ages and on a life course approach by recognizing the valuable contribution of older persons to society. A special event is organized annually on October 1st to celebrate the "International Day of Older Persons".

2. Committee on the Status of Women: - This committee is working on actual themes regarding "Women's Rights", "Violence against Women and Girls", "Unequal gender division of paid and unpaid work", "Unequal payment for equal jobs" are always part of the agenda. Seminars and special events are organized with outside agencies and other Committees.

3. Committee on Sustainable Development: - This committee focuses on the potential for practical cooperation with the UN and other international organizations in the key areas such as:

- Sustainability in the context of global economic expansion, with particular attention to Sustainability.
- Food security: Provision of the necessary quantity and quality of food for all.
- Provision of sustainable energy for all.
- Education for sustainability.

Sustainable Development Goals (SDG's) also play an important role in the work of the other Committees.

4. Committee on Drugs and Crime: - This committee has around 200 members from all around the world. Meetings and events usually take place during the UN International Conferences on Drugs and Crime. (UNODC) Attention is paid to themes like:

- * Anti-Corruption
- * Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice
- * Health and Social Development
- * Maritime Crime
- * Wildlife and Forest Crime
- * Terrorism Prevention
- * Transnational Organized Crime

History and Team: Ulrike Nemling initiated Inner Wheel's involvement in 1989, I have represented IIW since end of 1998 and Gerda Beck joined our team as a third Representative in April 2023.

Committee Meetings and Activities: Committee-Meetings take place once a month and are attended by Representatives from the different NGO's registered as members of the respective Committee. During a meeting several themes are discussed. This can either be something new coming up, a follow-up on earlier discussions or the preparation of a Statement, which is the most important activity, and has to be seen as an "on-going matter" as it may take several months to prepare and finish Statements. These Statements are then presented at the Sessions of the different United Nations Commissions.

Sometimes special "working-groups" are installed to work on topics that need more in depth attention.

As Representatives of a women's organization, we try to pay special attention to aspects concerning women.

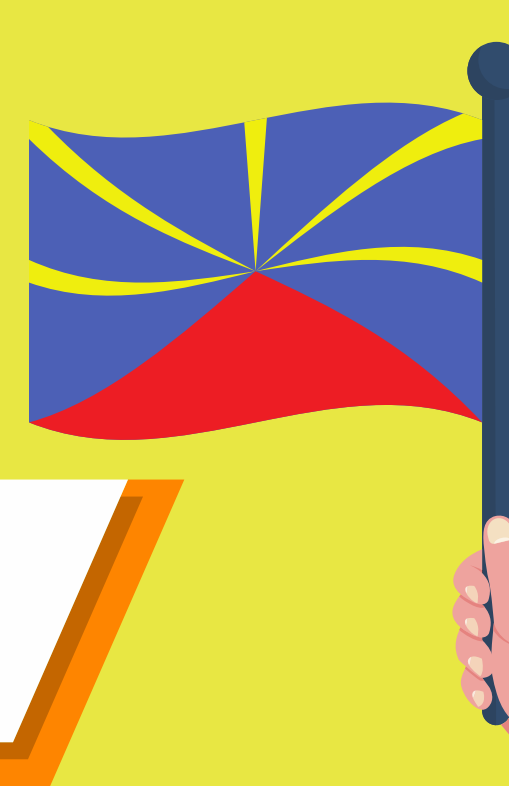


Supporting Cord Blood Research
